What are the hazards?	Transmission of Covid-19	
Who might be harmed?	Facility Users, staff, volunteers, visitors and the wider community	
No	Controls Required	Action Taken by the Club
People Management and Communication		
	Self-screening of individuals before they arrive at the venue to ensure individuals displaying Covid-19 symptoms or those who should be shielding do not travel or attend.	All players and officials to be contacted before the match and advised that if they are displaying symptoms of Covid-19 according to Government guidelines or they are currently shielding that they do not travel or attend the match.
	An assessment of user numbers, space capacities, venue circulation and layout planning to maintain social distancing	Access to toilets clearly marked with signage to maintain social distancing in place. No other access to the pavilion is permitted and signs put up to that effect.
	A plan for where spectators and players will sit whilst watching cricket activities	All spectators can remain in their cars. If they wish to sit outside the boundary they should maintain social distancing of 2m at all times unless with members of their own family / bubble. Players should be sat in front of the old netting area - again maintaining social distancing of 2m at all times.
	A plan to cover spectators, volunteers or players developing symptoms of Covid-19 during an event.	If a spectator, volunteer or player develops symptoms during a match or event, they should be sent home immediately or go to our isolation room (the room next to the umpires changing room). They should then be taken for testing and if they test positive they should inform the club so that track and trace procedures can be followed.
	Signage and communication so that all participants and visitors are aware of the control measures in place and how to act appropriately to minimise the risk of transmission of Covid-19	Clear signage around the ground regarding social distancing and hand sanitising and how to act appropriately to minimise the risk of transmission of Covid-19

	Volunteer training to support the implementation of the plan, with suitable training records	The completed risk assessment will be emailed to the membership and a written record kept by the Secretary of replies that it has been read and understood
Buildings		
	Assess ventilation in your building (natural and mechanical) and take appropriate measures to maximise ventilation and minimise risk of transmission	All windows and doors opened during matches, including toilet areas. There is no mechanical ventilation in the building that is open at present.
	Assess the maximum occupancy of your rooms at 2m social distancing (or 1m with risk mitigation where 2m is not possible) and establish a suitable circulation system / one way system. Use signage and floor marking to communicate this.	At present the clubhouse is closed, however, when opened, the maximum number of people allowed inside will be set at forty. 2m social distancing and relevant signage will be applied.
	Consider your wet weather plans and describe what actions you will take to maintain social distancing in wet weather	In the event of wet weather, spectators and players should stay in their cars, or sit under the covered area over the old nets, again maintaining social distancing at all times.
Social and Hospitality Areas		
	Plan to solicit and maintain records of your member attendance, and visitors - to be maintained for 21 days and then be destroyed.	A record of all match-day personnel (players, officials, groundstaff, scorers etc) should be kept in the pavilion to include name and contact details. This will be destroyed after 21 days in accordance with track and trace procedures.
	Identification of suitable areas for outdoor service that don't overlap with cricket activity	Not required as the pavilion is closed
Hygiene and Cleaning		
	Materials, PPE and training that you have provided to your volunteers for effective cleaning	Hand sanitisers, wipes, and PPE purchased by the Club and is available to volunteers. These items are in situ in the pavilion in the entrance.
	Provision of hand washing facilities with warm water, soap, disposable towels and bins	Each hand basin in the toilets are equipped with warm water, soap, disposable towels and bins which are emptied on a regular basis.
	Provision of suitable hand sanitiser in locations around the facility to maintain frequent hand sanitisation	Hand sanitisers are situated at the entrance to the pavilion.

	Provision of suitable wipes and hand sanitiser on the field for hygiene breaks	Umpires to carry hand sanitisers for hygiene breaks during matches. A hygiene break should take place every six overs or every 20 minutes and should include hand sanitisation and the cleaning of the ball.
What are the hazards?	Other venue hazards to be considered after temporary closure such as Legionnaire's Disease, fire, electrical safety etc

	Consider the risk of Legionnaire's Disease and carry out necessary work to make your water supply safe for users.	Not applicable
	Check that routine maintenance has not been missed and certification is up to date.	All certification is up to date at present
	Check that your ground is ready and safe to play. Look at what work is required and how this can be done safely at a social distance.	The GMA Interim Works and Fit for Play Document has been download, printed and made available to all volunteers who are involved in working on preparing the grounds.
What are the hazards?	Vital first aid equipment is not available when needed. First Aiders do not have adequate PPE to carry out First Aid when required.

	Check that your First Aid kits are stocked and accessible during all activity.	All First Aid kits have been checked and restocked. Locations - Pavilion kitchen, behind the bar, Jimmy Little kitchen. Two first aid bags are available for players during match days.
	What steps have you taken to improve your First Aider's understanding of First Aid provision under Covid-19	All First Aid kits have been updated according to Covid-19 regulations. Face masks and new instructions on CPR have been placed in the First Aid boxes.
	If you have an AED, then check that it is in working order, service is	The AED has been checked and serviced and is available during all activity.
